- I. John-4 hearts. Two suit fit.Dan-3 hearts. That's enough.Mr. X. 3 hearts-give partner a chance to get out
- 2. John-4 hearts. Game. No more Dan-3 hearts. That's enough. Mr. X-4 hearts. Strong enough opposite a minny.
- 3. John-2NT. Invitational only Dan-2NT What else?
- Mr. X-2NT straight value bid. Partner can bid spades if he wishes
- 4. John-3NT Points for game and double club stopper Dan-2NT but better than #3 Mr. X-3NT too strong for 2NT
- 5. John-3 spades, forcing, looking for spade or diamond slam
 Dan-2 spades. Would have bid 4 spades on my first turn
 Mr. X-2 spades. Need more information for proper level and strain
- 6. John-3 clubs. Again looking for slam

Dan-4 clubs. This is only hand suitable for a 2 club bid. Mr. X-3 clubs. Too strong for 4 hts.

On behalf of the members of the Buffalo Police Department we are delighted that you will be attending the bridge tournament at the Hyatt Hotel. We carefully monitor and review reports of crime throughout the city and particularly our downtown theater, dining and meeting venues. This on-going review reflects very few

A special detail of police officers is assigned downtown, and they work closely with all of the establishments and private security forces. These officers patrol in uniform and plain clothes and in cars of on bicycles and horse back. They are headquartered in a building located in the heart of the Theater District and communicate through police radios and a secondary radio system that connects them with businesses and private security personnel.

Even with fewer reports of crime and the increased visibility and protection of the police, we encourage all visitors to take common sense precautions so that they are not victimized by crime. These steps include:

- Using well-lighted and staffed parking garages close to the location where you will be.
- * Never leaving personal property visible in your parked vehicle.
- 4 Walking in groups or with a buddy.
- * Carefully reviewing the enclosed brochure on personal safety.

I hope you enjoy your bridge tournament this fail, and the Buffalo Police Department is pleased to assist you with your needs.
