The Alert Procedure - Part I

"Alert!"

How many times have you heard that and realized, "Oops! What is my partner doing to me?"

In fact, you are not entitled to that information. As far as you are concerned, you may not hear the alert, even though you can, in actuality, hear it.

Example 1: The auction proceeds:

You	LHO	Partner	RHO
Pass	Pass	1♠	Pass
2.♦*			

* Alerted by partner as reverse Drury which describes your hand as containing four or more spades and 9-11 or 10-12 points in support of spades.

The auction continues:

Pass 4 Pass

?

Your hand is:

What options do you have? None! You must pass! You must bid as though you did not hear your partner's alert. Wouldn't you have been happy to table this hand, given the bidding, if there were no alert? Of course you would!

Example 2: You sit down with a new partner and she opens 1NT. You bid 2♦ and partner says, "Transfer". Oops! You hold:

When partner bids $2 \checkmark$, how many of you would now 'id $3 \checkmark$? The point is, YOU are not entitled to that information. Suppose partner holds:

Two hearts is as likely to make as two diamonds. You are not allowed to correct to a contract because you heard your partner alert your bid. Alerts are for the opponents' benefit, not yours!

The two examples above have both occurred at the Bridge Centre during this calendar year. In the first example, a good player bid 5♦. This is totally incorrect and not allowable. In the second example, a relative novice bid 3♦ hoping to buy the contract there. Again incorrect and not allowed.

It is easy to understand that sometimes we do not understand the laws and get it wrong. That's OK, but from now on consider yourself armed with new knowledge so that you won't take unauthorized information from your partner's alert!

The History of Swiss Teams

Did you ever wonder why they call team games "Swiss" teams? Marc Low, the inventor, while playing and reminiscing recently at the San Antonio Nationals, got the idea from chess. In the chess Swiss movement, winners play winners and losers play losers because there isn't enough time for everyone to play everybody. He couldn't see why the same concept wouldn't work in bridge. Instead of playing a full session of two or three board matches as in board-amatch contests, play longer matches and score them on IMPs. In the next round winners would play winners and losers would play losers. Subsequent pairings would put together teams with comparable records. This way the cream would slowly move to the top. ACBL let Marc try it once at a Cincinnati Sectional about thirty years ago. The new game was an instant success. They liked the longer matches and the win-loss concept. The first time Swiss Teams was tried on the regional level, 98 teams signed up - more than double the number that were usually played in a board-a-match event. Swiss Teams were on their way.
