### A Bad Day – Laverne Lewis

After I drove home from work recently, I ripped off my "Have a Good Day" bumper sticker.

Let me tell you why!

I walked into the office and my boss told me, "Don't bother taking off your coat."

I'm driving home and my horn gets stuck behind a bunch of Hell's Angels.

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After that I drove my car into the repair shop. The mechanic took one look and began singing "I'm in the money".

OH, by the way the mechanic did such a great job repairing the car that when I ripped off the bumper sticker, the bumper came with it.

Now wouldn't you call that a Bad Day?

Mike Silverman and Lou DiLorenzo submitted the following:

Is Distribution Everything?

As we sit around the bridge table, we frequently hear Marty Bergen's best seller Points Schmoints paraphrased as "*Distribution Is Everything*". Bergen devotees contend that it's the shape of a hand that determines a contract, and not the point count. Yet, all the bridge primers (Goren, Culbertson, Sheinwold, Kantor, Lawrence, etc.) stress upon the novice the importance of point count. Their most common guideline suggests 26 high card points are necessary for game in no-trump and the majors, 28 points for game in the minors, and 33 points for a slam. But if distribution is the critical factor, it should be reflected in the point count of contracts made versus those not made. This study is an attempt to shed some light on this notion.

Travelers were collected from two sanctioned clubs in Unit 116 over a three-month period. These score sheets covered 4,188 contracts played by 47 different pairs. The stratification levels of the players broke down as "A" – 33%; "B" – 27%; and "C" – 40%.

At each session, 24 to 30 boards were played. Three sets of data were collected on the contracts played for each board:

- The combined high card points (HCP) for each pair.
- Whether each contract was made or went down.
- The score for each contract.

For reliability, contracts with small samples (<60) were dropped from the study. Contracts at the same level that received equal scores were grouped (i.e., two clubs and two diamonds).

The first observation made of the data was the wide range of HCP for all contracts bid and made. See table I.

A major observation of these data is the extremely low HCP at which all the contracts could be made. Since the contracts were bid with such low HCP, it may be concluded that they were made in large part due to unusual distributions (although weak defense may have played a role).

Although distribution could produce contract success despite low HCP, it was questioned whether the rate of success varied over the range of HCP. Table II shows this to be the case.

All contracts below the level of slams were made with 20 or less HCP at least 25% of the time. This degree of success, it might be concluded, is credited to the play of hands with special distributions. However, as the rate of contract success increases, there is a continuous rise in the number of HCP. Distribution isn't everything

Finally, an effort was made to tease out whether distribution could be a factor in making overtricks. Table III shows the frequency of over-tricks by contract.

The duplicate scoring system would account for some of the high rates of overtricks made inasmuch as no extra score is awarded for higher bids, which include the overtricks. The more critical overtricks are noted in the 2 NT and 3H/3S contracts, since these could have been game contracts. Likewise, of the 481 contracts at 4H/4S, 115 (24%) achieved an unbid slam. The Table III data also replicate the findings of an earlier study in which 3 NT was found to have the highest rate of success while 5C/5D had the lowest.

### OVERALL CONCLUSIONS

While distribution isn't everything, it appears to carry as much weight as HCP in most contract hands. Special distribution hands, including voids, singletons, long suits (6+), and two-suited hands, comprised 59% of all hands studied. They occur often, and contribute significantly to the bidding. Players might well be advised to focus on distribution first, and then count their HCP. Bergen, as well as other bridge gurus, recommends counting "distribution points" in determining overall strength of a hand.

Even with allowance for the duplicate scoring system, players' bidding tends to be conservative. The percentage of all contracts making overtricks is larger than the percentage not making the contract.

Finally, a tighter follow-up study is needed in which each hand is identified as either "flat" (no 5-card suits) or having a special distribution. A comparison of similar data could be made of these two groups

From **John Bielinski**, we received the following:

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The three people we've chosen are:

**Nat Gerstman** on Friday.  
**Margaret McCarthy** on Saturday.  
**Thomas Wolstoncroft** on Sunday.

Below are short bios on these members:

**Nat Gerstman** loved bridge and he loved having a good time. He was incredibly well educated (law degree Columbia University), but all he ever wanted to do was to play bridge and have a good time.

In order to earn a living, he worked for his father. One great story is that his father set it up among his best clients that Nat would drop by and ask for an order and they would make a huge order (which his father would give them a discount on) just to make Nat feel he really could do this. Well, a day or two later, Nat's father called up the customer and asked what happened and they said Nat never showed up! It turned out he had gone to a bridge tournament instead!

Nat was one of the first avid tournament players to actively "roll the dice" by making a skip bid (he loved to call it a "skippity bid") and place maximum pressure on the opponents. He figured it was a 2-1 shot (there were two of them who had no idea of what he had, but there was only one partner who had no idea!) and his odds were pretty good. Nowadays people have a pretty good idea of how to deal with a large pre-empt by doubling with values and/or shape. Back then it wasn't so well understood, so it was a real crapshoot. Since it was their hand, the crapshoot appealed to Nat. - submitted by **Dan Gerstman**

**Nat Gerstman** loved to play preempts, but you never knew what they were. He would play 5,6,7, etc but they could be empty to the Ace or topped by Ace, King, Queen – submitted by Betty **Fudeman**

Nat would come to play bridge with no shoes – submitted by **Helen Sloan**.

When I knew Nat, twenty to thirty years ago, he had 5,000 masterpoints and was considered an excellent player – submitted by **Dan Foley**

**Margaret McCarthy** was the Secretary/ Treasurer of Unit 116 for eighteen years. Professionally, she worked as a full time book-keeper for Calspan (which was Cornell Aero-nautical Lab at that time).

She was also a wife and the mother of 3 children.

Margaret became a Life Master in the days when the only master points awarded were at Sectionals, Regionals and Nationals and one point for winning at a local club monthly tourney. In those days there was only 2 or 3 bridge clubs operating in the Buffalo area so it was a real feat to become a life master.

Margaret was a friendly, generous person who was always willing to help new bridge players. She also taught and administered the tests to become a Director before the ACBL had Audrey Grant and the teaching staff on board. – Submitted by **Alice Lind**.

Mother, while in high school, started to play bridge when she attended church – sponsored auction bridge parties with her mother. In the 1930's, she and some friends took private contract bridge lessons. She was the only one who took the game seriously and later started to play duplicate bridge. She became a life master sometime in the mid-1960's after she retired. She served as secretary-treasurer of the Frontier Chapter of the ACBL. She resigned about 2 years before her death in January 1987.

As far as a mentor is concerned, it was her friend **Agnes Gordon**, who was a superb player. In fact Agnes played in the World Cup.

It is wonderful that Margaret has not been forgotten - submitted by **Kathleen McCarthy**, daughter.

**Thomas B. Wolstoncroft** died in 1998 at the age of 55. He was born in Oil City, Pennsylvania but his family moved to Buffalo when he was a child. He was an accountant and father of three.

He was a Silver Life Master who became an ACBL tournament director in 1990. He was very concerned about the players and thought his job was to make each tournament as enjoyable as possible. He was an excellent bridge player and a formidable opponent. Playing against him one time I looked at my hand and I held 13 hearts. While I'm in shock Tom passed and I saw my partner's face looking at 13 clubs. Someone had put a new deck in the board and it was not shuffled. I said to Tom, "how could you pass?" He said, "I knew the board wouldn't be passed out."

He was awarded the Anne McGilvery Award by the District in 1999. The award is given to those who personify the image of ethics and courtesy in the District. Tom certainly did and we miss him. - submitted by **Christy Kellogg**

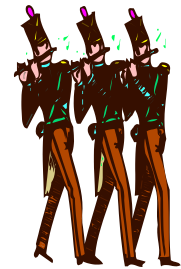
