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President's Message



I'm beginning with the old adage, "you can please some of the people some of the time, but you can't please all of the people all the time." In February I summarized the objects of the organization, none of which were meant to be more important than the other unless the priority was meant to be in the order mentioned. So how do we promote and stimulate playing bridge; hold and promote tournaments; and promote area clubs... all fairly? The Board is trying.

A Unit game should bring together players from all clubs; it should bring out the Rookies and all NLMs as well as the Life Masters and above (122 being Bronze and Silver LMs); it should be a welcome event and attended no matter where it is held. Recently it was repeated to me that a player had commented how nice it was to play in a Unit game and meet and play with players she would not otherwise have had the opportunity to do so. That should be what we're all about.

Our unit reportedly now has **515** members (this fluctuates due to snowbirds changing back and forth, so we are currently high) of which **343** are under the rank of Life Master – two-thirds of our membership! This is worthy of a separate Sectional and so the Unit did this - expanding from a 299er to a 499er tournament. **Kudos** to **Betty Metz** for organizing a very special event attended by many of our NLMs plus players from across the border, Rochester and Central New York as well as a few from farther afield. A total of 90.5 tables for the weekend...that's 362 players, granted some played every day. Thank you to the local NLMs that participated and supported this.

The picnic on June 27th had a good turnout even to the Southtowns!! **Kudos** to Pat **Rasmus** for her efforts in getting some of you folks out to this event and having a "fine spread." As most of you already know, Pat has resigned from the Board. She will and has already been sorely missed – and who wants to follow in her footsteps!!!

Lastly I'd like to extend some **Kudos** to Kathy **Pollock** for her initiative, planning, and holding Youth Bridge Camps this summer.

They finally found out she kept putting the cards back into her hands, desperately replaying them again and again.

As co-editor of the Buff, I have the distinct honor of interviewing my wife, Bernie. I told her being an accountant made her perfect for the game, she is certainly perfect for me.

I started playing Duplicate Bridge when smoking was banned from the clubs. My husband encouraged me to learn the game. When I started, I played with a gentlemen called Bernie. Mary Davey-Carr was the youngest of three children born to **John and Anna Davey**. She graduated from the Cathedral School and Nardin Academy. She received a law degree in 1952 from the University Of Buffalo School Of Law. She was admitted to the New York State bar the same year.

After practicing law as an associate in a local firm, she was appointed Assistant Counsel with the Navy General Counsel's office in Washington, D.C.

She organized the Juvenile Legal Division when legislation was passed for a new Family Court, supervised the division for several years.

Following several years as Legal Assistant to the Commissioner for Human Rights, Judge Davey Carr was appointed as the Administrative Law Judge for the NYS Department of Social Services, the first woman to serve in this position.

Judge Davey-Carr traveled the counties of the state hearing appeals from county commissioners regarding public assistance and medical assistance. Later she was appointed Supervisor of the New York

I've been known to say, "It's just a game!", as I go down six tricks doubled and vulnerable.

The computer claims that 4 of a major is the optimum spot for this hand but I bet many duplicate players would rather take their chances at NT. E should be able to open 1NT after 3 passes. Then he has to decide what to do after partner's Stayman response.

Some players might suppress their ♠s and bid 2♦ with their flat minimum. Not a good idea, according to Hal (the computer), because that gets the pair to the 2nd best game contract. Ineluctable? Perhaps, but a small defensive error and E can conceivably make 11 tricks in NT! Stephen Dedalus had his eyes closed in this chapter of *Ulysses*. Can you see the way to make NT work after, say, a ♣ opening lead?

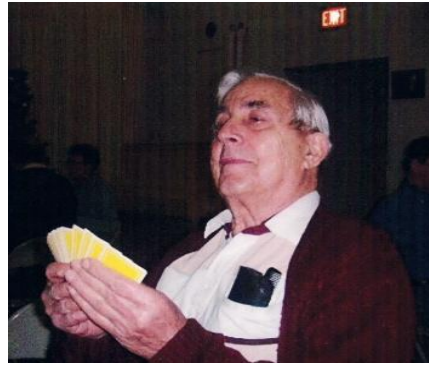

Tribute to More than a Quarter of a Century to the Unit 116 Bridge World

Bill and Peg Rieker established a game with Bob Winkler in May of 1983 at the Nickel City Café. Bob helped Bill and Peg there for about three years. The Club then moved to the Lord Amherst on Main, averaging about 15 tables a day on Monday, Wednesday and Friday for many years. The game eventually moved to the Zion Church where Bill and Peg ran it for 17 years, and early this year they convinced Dian Petrov to donate his time and effort to extend the nice bridge traditions established in B&P Duplicate Club.

Running a bridge club is a challenge, but the first several months of existence of the successor – Bridge Club Meridian is promising. Riekers' were instrumental in making Bridge a game to be enjoyed by not only the advanced players, but by newcomers, too. Bill donated many years of service to the Unit 116 as a Board Member and planning Sectionals, Unit Games and aided in the planning of Regionals and National Events in Buffalo in 1988 and in Niagara Falls in 1982. His objective rulings, his advice to novice players, his sense of humor made playing bridge an enjoyable experience.

Peg for years was willing to play with any extra players without partners. She is an excellent teacher of the game, helping many learn a variety of conventions, how to use them, and how to play them. Her patience certainly helped to encourage even those who might have had difficulties comprehending those conventions with which they were unfamiliar.

Bill and Peg always went out of their way to promote the Bridge Community and Unit 116 in particular. A good example is how they helped me. After being tutored by Brian Meyer, I was finally ready to take the Director's Test. Bill and Peg volunteered their Club for me to take the test. Such generosity has always been their forte.

Their basic philosophy was that game was to be enjoyed, to be fun. But fun or not, Bill and Peg are really tough opponents at the table. Their bridge "philosophies" were always the same (chuckle, chuckle!); the end result was hoping that you were able to hold your own. Bill and Peg promoted the game and encouraged all that played to enjoy themselves (refreshments, often made by Peg were always excellent). Peg often if not always made the comment, "It's a GAME, points-smoints-ENJOY!"

On behalf of the entire Unit 116 membership, thank you Bill and Peg for your significant contribution to the game of Bridge.
