#### Interview Corner

The editor recently interviewed **Usha Khurana**, an upcoming bridge player,
who demonstrates an eagerness to learn
duplicate bridge.

#### Bridge:

- She started playing bridge three years ago.
- She met Claire Gareleck through a mutual friend and joined the Bridge Center of Buffalo without any knowledge or formal training in Bridge.
- She struggled through her first year reading Audrey Grant's book and with

- the guidance of **Claire Gareleck** began playing in the mentoring bridge sessions.
- Afterwards Eugene Harvey started teaching courses which helped her with renewed confidence Usha began playing in the open games occasionally. She currently plays at least three times a week.
- She has several favorite players who encourage her to improve her game.
- Her most memorable time was when she was playing in an open game as novice and came across a hand where her partner opened one heart. She had 20-21 HCP; a slam hand holding all four Aces. She kept wondering that she couldn't bid 4NT as all the aces were in her hand. Eventually the contract was 4H making seven. She was greatly embarrassed but it seems amusing now to think back.
- She has played in two different Regionals in several sessions. John Marvin III encouraged her to play as his partner in one session of both Regionals, which helped get over the nervousness.
- Her goal for Unit 116 is for members to exhibit courtesy and sportsmanship at the table.

#### Personal:

- Her family consists of a son and daughter-in-law (of American origin) and a granddaughter. Her family is very close knit and for that she feels she is indeed fortunate.
- She retired from Roswell Park Cancer Institute where she worked as a Research Scientist in Clinical Immunology followed by four years in Millard Fillmore Gate Circle Hospital.
- She has lived in the United States (Buffalo) for the last 41 years. Her roots are here now and she visits her country of origin (India) every year as a tourist. She is a good blend of two cultures which makes her life easy. She is very Spiritualistic born Hindu with great respect for all religions.
- She was an Indian classical dancer in her youth and gave several dance performances here in Buffalo and

- Canada during her first few years in the United States.
- Her hobbies have changed over the years and they currently are: Contract Bridge along with reading, cooking, travelling and socializing.
- Socializing is a big thing with people from India because they left families behind, so friends become family.
- The editor asked her about her unusual name – "USHA" - it has a special meaning. It means "early morning" "DAWN". All names from India have special meanings.

The editor also recently interviewed a creative and knowledgeable bridge player. His name is **Eugene Harvey.** Eugene also sends the editor a column which appears in the Buff.

#### Bridge:

- At the age of 7, he played Kitchen Bridge with his grandmother. The person who started him down the path of Duplicate Bridge was Jim Gullo who gave him "Bridge for Dummies" for Christmas around 1997. He read it...and read it...and read it again.
- He started out playing Strong 2's and penalty doubles (back then, a strong takeout bid was a direct cuebid). When Jim asked him to play in Fredonia, he met one of his greatest bridge friends and role models, Mrs. Irene Otto. As regular partners, they "CLEANED UP" in the 299er games! He won most of his silver points with her. At the St. Catherine's Sectionals, the partnership did so well; the 299ers knew them by name.
- He learned more about the game by playing with Donna Steffan, Judy Graf and Joanne Kelley. He never took formal lessons from anyone but was able to learn the bidding style of Paul Thurston from his friends. He has read a "LOT" of bridge books and developed good declarer play and defensive skills from the Daily Bridge Calendar.
- As to who are his favorite players, Eugene answered: "I admire Buddy Seidenberg, who I believe is the best male player actively playing at the clubs. In WNY, the 'best female bridge player' award has to go to Chris Urbanek, whose talent at the table truly is remarkable."

- His favorable memory at playing Duplicate Bridge was when he was playing in a Grand National Teams qualifier (GNTs) in Meadville, PA. His team consisted of Joanne Kelly, Judy Graf and Mike Ryan. In order to qualify the second day, you had to be one of the top 4 teams. It appeared that their team would end up 5<sup>th</sup>. In the deciding match between Jim **Gullo**'s team (already in the top 4) and the team just behind them, Jim's team beat them so badly that Eugene's team made it to the top 4 by only ONE POINT!!! The second day they met Jim's team in the finals and beat them to win the event and the chance to represent our District at the nationals in Atlanta. They owe their win to **Jim Gullo**. ☺ (Sorry Jim...)
- His main goal for the Bridge community is teaching, which he absolutely loves. Nothing gives him more satisfaction than seeing his bridge students get a good result against him. Recently he's been playing with his students in Regional tournament team games such a Knockouts and Swiss teams in order to introduce them to the strategies of these events. He encourages ALL 'newer' players to play in high-quality bridge games, particularly tournaments. You won't learn anything playing against the same people.
- He is an ACBL-Certified Bridge Teacher and has been teaching for five years predominantly at the Bridge Center. He has taught some private lessons as well. To get certified, one must attend a special 2-day program, usually at a national tournament, where you are taught the basics of instructions and also about the ACBL curriculum (which recently, has had another revision).
- His involvement in Unit 116 is through the contribution of a bi-monthly article to his column "The Bridge Gene-ie." So far, so good! Please make sure you e-mail Eugene at bridgegenie@gmail.com with any questions, especially newer/299er players out there.

#### Personal:

He was a clinical social worker for many years, working mostly in the mental health field. Earlier this year, he decided to make a career change to the field of library and information science. He received a full

- tuition scholarship to boot so it was a deal he could not refuse. So far, he loves it!
- Eugene won't admit it but he is a great cook. If you happen to attend a session of Duplicate Bridge at the Bridge Center when he prepares a Friday meal, you are in for a treat!
- He belongs to the following organizations: American Library Association and National Association of Social Workers. He also is a Licensed Social Worker in New York.
- His favorite sports and hobbies are volleyball, cooking and baking, pumpkin carving, science fiction and fantasy, and anything that has to do with games or cards.
- He likes to volunteer to help others in need. Eugene encourages others to do the same so they can find out how satisfying it can be!

# More things Horatio!? A hand from the BBC 299ers game by John Marvin

It is possible to make 12 tricks in  $\clubsuit$ ,  $\blacktriangledown$ , or NT. Play the hand out in all 3 contracts (it doesn't matter what level) and you'll see. 31 point slams, on the other hand, often depend (as in this hand) upon the location of a Q.

Planning your play you must assess what "the room" will be doing. If you're in 3NT should you play for 12 tricks?

In match points you must take all the tricks you can to get consistently winning results. True, after a ◆opening lead by N declarer might want to take 10 tricks and be satisfied, but in a strong game, that may not be a top. If E were playing it & S had led his 4<sup>th</sup> best ◆declarer would have had 2 stoppers. If N had led a ♠ declarer would have had timing.

On the other hand, if you're not in slam, perhaps you should hope the club finesse won't work and play to drop the doubleton Q off sides? You might ask yourself, "How's our game at this point in time. Do we need all the match points or will an average plus do?"

Gosh! There's a lot to think about.

# The Bridge Gene-ie By Eugene Harvey

By the time you read this column, we'll likely be into the holiday season, which probably brings fond memories to many of us. When I was a

young kid, I remember how much fun I had watching the *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer* cartoon on television. Despite 'stop-motion

being outdated in technological age, fond memories of of the best parts of the songs, and one was "We're a Misfits" sung by

the duo of Rudolph and Hermey the Misfit Elf (who wanted to study to be a dentist instead of making toys – what's wrong with him?!

As I was reminiscing, I could not help but think of the problems of "misfits" in bridge. Have you ever wondered what to do with some of the more distributional hands you hold? For example, here's your hand:

★ KJ852
♥97
◆7
★ AQ642

...and the bidding ensues (both opponents silent):

Partner	You (Responder)
1♥	1♠
2♦	??

Partner opened 1♥, so you respond 1♠. Then partner rebids 2♦. Remember, the opener's job is to describe the strength and shape of their hand. Thinking about the bidding, partner is showing at least 9 cards in the two red suits (likely 5♥'s and 4♦'s and since they did not jump-shift (to 3♦), their hand strength is limited to a basic opener. How much do you like your hand? What do you plan to do?

Some newer players tend to bid, bid, bid..to they might try 3. Well, let's think about this bid. First of all, you, as the responder changes suits, it is 100% forcing for another round of bidding. In other words, the opener will have to bid again. As a result, partner might try a 3NT game with the following hand:

You
<b>♠</b> KJ852
<b>∀</b> '97
<b>◆</b> 7
♣ A Q 6 4 2

As you can tell, this contract likely will be disastrous. There are gaps everywhere, and the hands are misfits with no good intermediates cards. (Js, 10s, 9s) and no good source of tricks in NT.

As soon as your side senses a misfit, it's best to keep the bidding as low as possible. For this hand, you should carefully retreat back to your partner's first bid suit.

Partner	You
1♥	1♠
2♦	2♥
Pass	

You simply are taking a preference to one of your



partner's suits and putting the brakes on the bidding. Even in 2 partner may struggle, but at least they can a loser or two in dummy. If you are in NT,

you will not have that luxury...

I love the Island of Misfit Toys in the *Rudolph* cartoon, but it sure isn't fun suffering with misfit hands in bridge.
