INTERVIEW CORNER



I am interviewing a man for whom I have great respect. Over the years he has been on the Unit 116 Board several times and volunteers for projects that benefit Unit members when they come up. This person is **Jay Levy**.

Bridge:

1. When Jay returned to Penn State for his senior year, one of his roommates read a book about bridge and decided to teach him and two other persons. Jay got hooked on the game and spent most of his senior year playing bridge including duplicate.
2. Jay moved around with his jobs and when he settled in Glens, NY, he played more duplicate bridge and eventually became President of Unit 115 in the Capital District.
3. He never took lessons but the book that helped him the most was Sheinwalds' "5 Weeks to Winning Bridge."
4. In 1985 when he came to Buffalo, he served two terms on Unit 116 Board and 4 years as President. His last 2 years have been the most enjoyable since the Board really worked cooperatively to help bring the Unit together.
5. The two (2) bridge accomplishments he is really proud of are: First, winning the North American Pairs with his good friend, **Bill Rushmore**. They were 3rd with one round to go and moved up to first. The Second was winning 4 events at a Buffalo Regional with different partners in each event, including one game with **Brian Meyer** that was literally arranged in the parking lot as he was pulling out of the hotel.

- Now that he has retired, he would like to do some teaching, principally to newer players who are trying to reach various goals, concentrating on the mental approach to the game.

Personal:

- Jay has been married for 16 years to Linda and has five (5) children and six (6) (soon to be 7) grandchildren. They are located in San Francisco, Charlotte, Washington, DC, Saratoga, NY and Buffalo.
- He has been blessed to have two (2) living parents aged 97 and 91; unfortunately they are both in skilled nursing facilities in Florida.
- He has had three careers; Financial Management with GE, Financing auto dealers with Marine Midland Automotive and 18 years as a Financial Advisor.
- With his job at GE, his assignments took him to Schenectady, NY, Milan, Italy, Ponce, Puerto Rico and finally in Glens, NY.

Bridge:

- Ken considers himself an "*average player*" and likes to be competitive.
- Ken plays with a variety of players at all levels.
- He enjoys playing at the Whist Club on Monday evening or the Bridge Center on Wednesday. Both games feature the best players in the area!
- Ken feels he is still learning some-thing new especially in games or tournament play.
- He recently accumulated enough points to become a Bronze Life Master and in his words –"**whoopee**

- Ken feels that as a bridge community and Unit 116, the people at the helm of the Unit are first-class and the people he has met and played either with or against are among the finest people he has the pleasure of meeting.

Being an intermediate player at best, my greatest skill is not in bidding, or playing. It is in picking my partners. Needless to say, they are all intelligent.

Below is what the Buffalo Bridge Center does for inappropriate behavior. If this occurs at a club where you play, encourage the Director to use these guidelines.

Call the Director If

- Negative comments are made concerning partner's or opponent's play or bidding
- There's badgering, intimidation, rudeness, insinuations, profanity, threats or violence.
- There are constant and gratuitous lessons and analyses at the table.
- There is loud and disruptive arguing.
- There is annoying behavior or embarrassing remarks made.

Penalty: ¼ of board's points.

Do You Like 3NT – Try SUTL
By Lou DiLorenzo

If 3NT is the preferred contract, a fit can be determined at the one level by bidding Stoppers Up The Line (SUTL). In its simplest form, opener bids one club,, partner bids one diamond, opener bids one heart and partner bids one spade; Each of these bids shows a stopper in that suit and needs to be alerted. Any interference by the opponents negates the rise of SUTL. The absence of any interring bids is a good indication that game should be reached in 3NT or in a major.

There are several prerequisites for the use of SUTL and several conditions that deny its use. These are:

Sunday Bracketed Swiss – 1-8 tables/based on 24 tables

1. A combined holding of 22-23 HCP is required for 3NT to succeed 2 out of 3 hands. Opener should have 13-14HCPs and responder at least 9 HCP.
2. When opener has 15-17 or >20 HCP AND A 5-card major, SUTL is off, although 3NT may still end up as the contract.
3. For 3NT to succeed at the 75% level, SUTL should not be used when:
 1. Opener holds a void, two singletons or two doubletons.
 2. Holding a 6+ cards in a major in either hand.
 3. Qxx is the only stopper in a suit. The probability the two top honors in that suit are split between the opponents is > 50% when opponents have not bid.
4. No SUTL when opener lacks a stopper in three suits.

Anytime after the first bid, a bid of 1NT indicates all the conditions (stoppers, HCPs, etc.) for a 3NT contract have been met. A jump to 1NT may be bid by either the opener on the responder. To illustrate (West dealer):

The contract, despite 26HCP. Is doomed from trick one, even Stewart can't salvage this one! With a 3-3-4-3 split, 10 HCP and no suit to bid, the 3NT is the usual response. SUTL would uncover the lack of a heart stopper and 3NT would never be the contract if opener bids 1 Club.

SUTL is not always bid consecutively. The following hand shows the bidding when each partner lacks a stopper.

Dealer opens 1D showing lack of a club stopper. South's bid of 1S tells partner he has stoppers in both clubs and spades but none in hearts and at least 9 HCP. N bids 1N or 3N leaving an option to explore slam by S.

There are other nuances to SUTL that become obvious as one gains familiarity with the system. Would you like to try SUTL? Join me!

“The Bridge “Gene-ie” **By Eugene Harvey**

I really enjoy playing with my bridge students! I'm at a point in my “bridge life” where I neither need nor want any more master points, so, to me, being able to help others learn this fascinating game is a reward in itself, not to mention a way of growing our family of local bridge players. Playing with one of my students, we encountered the following hand:

Bidding Commentary: I was North and *transferred** to ♥s, then bid ♦s. My partner was confused by the 2nd bid and retreated to 3NT. After a transfer, a bid of a 2nd suit is 100% game-forcing. Although we should be in 4♥, it's not the end of the world. Hey, don't pick on us! When was the last time YOU were in the wrong contract?! *wink* It happens! No looking back now...

Opening Lead: ♥4 – 4th best from longest

Declarer Play: This hand has a lot of things that need to be worked upon, so I'm going to help my student analyze it step by step. First is the opening lead. The defenders were playing 4th best

leads, so after seeing the ♥2 and ♥3, the lead of the ♥4 should be from a 4-card suit. This is VERY important! It means East likely has only 1 heart. This lead is *favorable*; in other words, we can capitalize on their misfortune. When you get a favorable lead, it's important to know how to use that to your advantage. Knowing that East likely has only 1 heart, she should let the lead ride around to her ♥Q, then she should lead a low ♥ and finesse to the ♥7 – see how good intermediate cards (8s, 9s, 10s) can be helpful sometimes! Now she must find an *entry* back to her hand, which means a small ♦ back to the ♦A. Then she takes another ♥ finesse to pick up the entire ♥ suit! Woo hoo!

Now for the next step. ♦s are established, and there are no *dangerous* suits, but it's good to prevent East from gaining the lead and leading thru her ♣K-J, just in case West has the ♣A-Q. With all suits adequately guarded, she has the *timing* to try for more. The ♣ suit offers a 50% chance of another trick by leading toward the ♣J, but that is a scary situation if it loses! That suit is anemic, at best. Instead, let's check out that ♠ suit. Missing 2 honors, she could take a *double finesse*, which will succeed 75% of the time, so she should play the ♠10 and finesse. If East does not *cover the honor*, West will win the ♠K. Then, depending on what suit West uses to *exit* his hand, later my partner will use the ♦Q as an *entry* to dummy by overtaking it with the ♦K, then cashing the ♦J-10. Being brave – and playing the percentages – she will take the 2nd ♠ finesse and bring home the ♠ suit when the suit is divided 3-3! It will be important for her to recognize this source of tricks EARLY in the hand, though, since she will be forced to *discard* from her hand when playing the ♥ and ♦ suits. Discarding ♠s will result in some lost tricks!
